I. Approval of Minutes	Passed as presented.	Nancy motioned and Becky seconded.
II. Treasurer's Report	Terry reported: Prevention/Education - \$8,594.93 Treatment/Intervention - \$8,594.93 Criminal Justice Services - \$8,594.94 Discretionary - \$5,835.14 Total - \$31,619.94 User Fees - \$2,273 in April 2016, \$10,344 in 2016	Josh motioned. Tim seconded. Motion passed as presented.
III. Coordinator Report	Reminded group that June is election month for officers.	
IV. Representative Reports	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Tim reported 71 people arrested in April (about 20 lower than March) but count is going back up in May, in part due to the recent Round Up. Click It or Ticket is ongoing May 6 – 30, with local and state police doing extra patrols. Possible road blocks May 23-24. Jim asked about driving ATVs on county roads. Tim responded licensed and registered drivers only. Becky asked if Jennifer sees more clients when arrests increase. Jennifer said it takes about a year before those arrested become her clients, after court decisions are made. • Becky reported that the 28th Medication Collection got 353 pounds from 351 people April 30, despite pouring rain. • Josh reported about meds being used to help bring users out of overdose of opioids. Some of these meds are available at local drug stores. Twice as many people die from opiates than heroin. IN Attorney General is providing funding to law enforcement to pay for meds. Layne reported Brentwood has a clinic once a month to help clients understand these meds. 	
V. Other	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deb discussed CARES efforts, including SAMHSA, System of Care and Mental Health America – Indiana grants. She distributed bags with TRI-CAP service information and powerpoint from CARES Community Conversation meetings – approximately 133 people attended these

Also discussed the Youth Workshop held in April.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Angie discussed Healthy Families, including the Fatherhood Coalition (data showed that fathers aren't engaged in families). TRI-CAP recruited dads from Healthy Families programs to participate in the Fatherhood Coalition, with about 12 mentors. • Becky reported that her volunteers make sleep-sacks for young parents in Healthy Families program. She showed the sleep sacks. These sleep sacks help comfort babies and hopefully lower mental/substance use issues. • She also reported again about Medication Collections. These collections lower meds being dumped into environment and lowers risk of meds being stolen from medicine chests. • She's a CASA volunteer and sees youth who need therapy to help lower risk of future mental and/or substance use issues. DCS can provide funding for therapy. Janet shared that Southern Hills provides some therapy but it requires special training for anyone providing therapy for children under 5 years old. If court mandates therapy, it is free to families. • Toured TRI-CAP.
